- Continue to engage renters in advancing a climate-friendly policy agenda of affordability and mobility.
- Implement the next steps of a Shared Parking District to reduce the need for more parking
- Build the capacity of a communityfocused group to work with developers to incorporate EcoDistrict values into the design of planned projects.
- Support the development of a new land use planning framework for the neighborhood that includes EcoDistrict performance goals.
- Pilot a program to provide low cost transit passes to residents of affordable housing.
- Create opportunities to depave the Summit/Belmont subarea, improve stormwater runoff, add trees and green cover, and make the area more pedestrian-friendly.
